

He died on June 2nd, 2020 at age 67.

The Boston Classical Guitar Society is proud to have taken on the mission of engaging young, emerging guitarists with Frank's artistic legacy and spirit. The BCGS plans to award a yearly scholarship to a New England-based guitar student between the ages of 15 and 22 to continue their musical studies and make a positive impact with the guitar. 
